Increasing local graduation rates

24,039 free books Since its launch, United Way of Northeast Louisiana READ.LEARN. SUCCEED. has provided over 24,000 free books to local 2nd and 3rd graders in Lincoln Parish, Monroe City, Ouachita Parish, and Union Parish partner schools.

96% of **READ.LEARN.SUCCEED**. students in Lincoln Parish, Monroe City, and Ouachita Parish partner schools improved their reading skills during the 2016-2017 school year.

82 students received academic enrichment during the Summer of 2017 82 students enrolled in the Monroe City School Summer Camp*, providing a unique academic summer enrichment experience that helps fight summer slide (academic skill loss).

HEALTH

Increasing access to care and preventative health and nutrition services

In 2016, United Way of Northeast Louisiana 2-1-1 provided 1,257 referrals to clients to help meet their healthcare needs, including prescription assistance, Medicaid, mental health, dentistry, and medical equipment. 1,257 health referrals provided

\$77,542 prescription savings in 2016 United Way of Northeast Louisiana, in partnership with FamilyWize, provided free FamilyWize prescription discount cards, saving \$77,542 on prescription costs in 2016, an average of 43% savings per prescription.

FINANCIAL STABILITY

Increasing income, building savings, and gaining assets

During the 2016-2017 school year, 399 United Way of Northeast Louisiana Dollars & Sense Reality Fair volunteers provided free comprehensive financial education to 1,601 area high schoolers at events held in 27 high schools and community programs in 7 Northeast Louisiana parishes.

48% of Northeast Louisiana Families are ALICE The United Way ALICE Report for Louisiana, produced as part of a collaboration of 11 Louisiana United Ways, was updated and re-released in April 2017. The report highlights a population of people who work hard, yet still struggle to make ends meet. The report found that in Northeast Louisiana, 48% of the population is ALICE (Asset Limited Income Constrained Employed), prompting United Way to begin laying the groundwork for strategies that help address issues faced by ALICE. BASIC NEEDS

Increasing access to food, shelter, medicine, transportation and disaster relief

24,735 referrals provided In 2016, United Way of Northeast Louisiana 2-1-1 provided 24,735 referrals to clients to help meet their needs, including basics such as food, clothing and shelter, health care, volunteer opportunities and more.

Since 2010, the Emergency Food & Shelter Program, a FEMA grant facilitated and administered by United Way of Northeast Louisiana, has provided over 1,375 nights of shelter and 39,876 meals/food assistance to area residents.
